



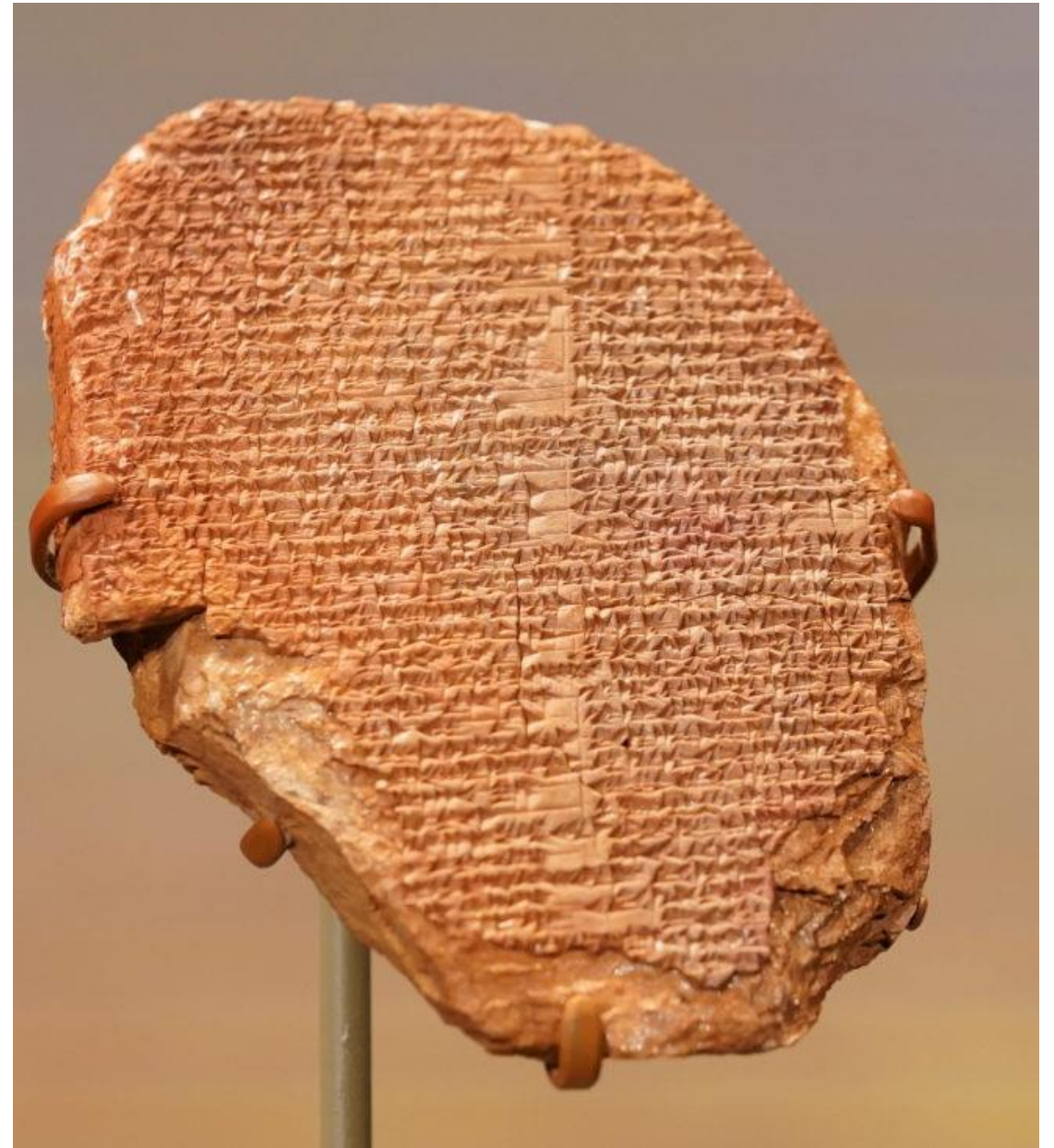

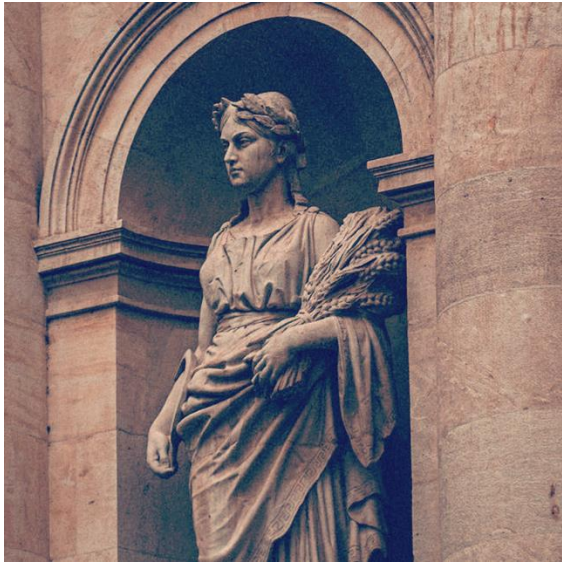

Persephone embodies the essence of beauty & vitality. Her story testifies to the complexity of feminine experience, reflecting themes of growth, transformation, and resilience.



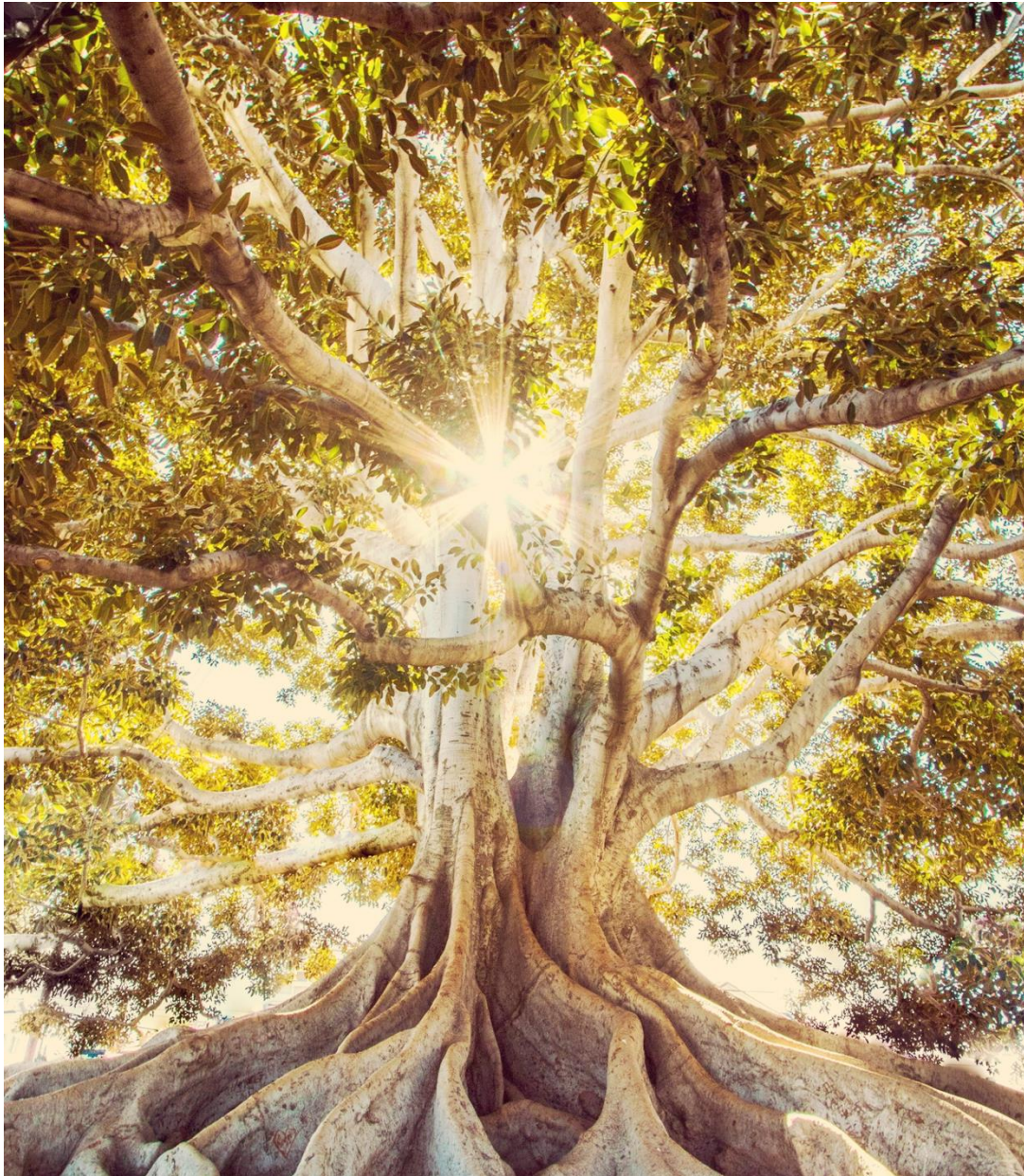
ENKIDU

UNDERSTANDING THE ROLES OF MAIDEN, MOTHER, AND CRONE

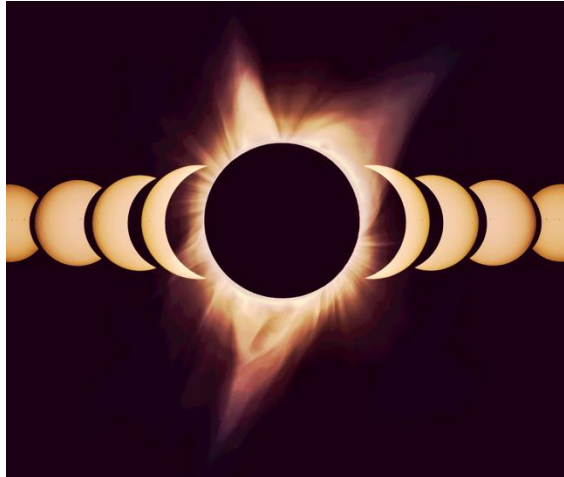
THE MOTHER SYMBOLIZES FERTILITY, NURTURING, AND FULFILLMENT.

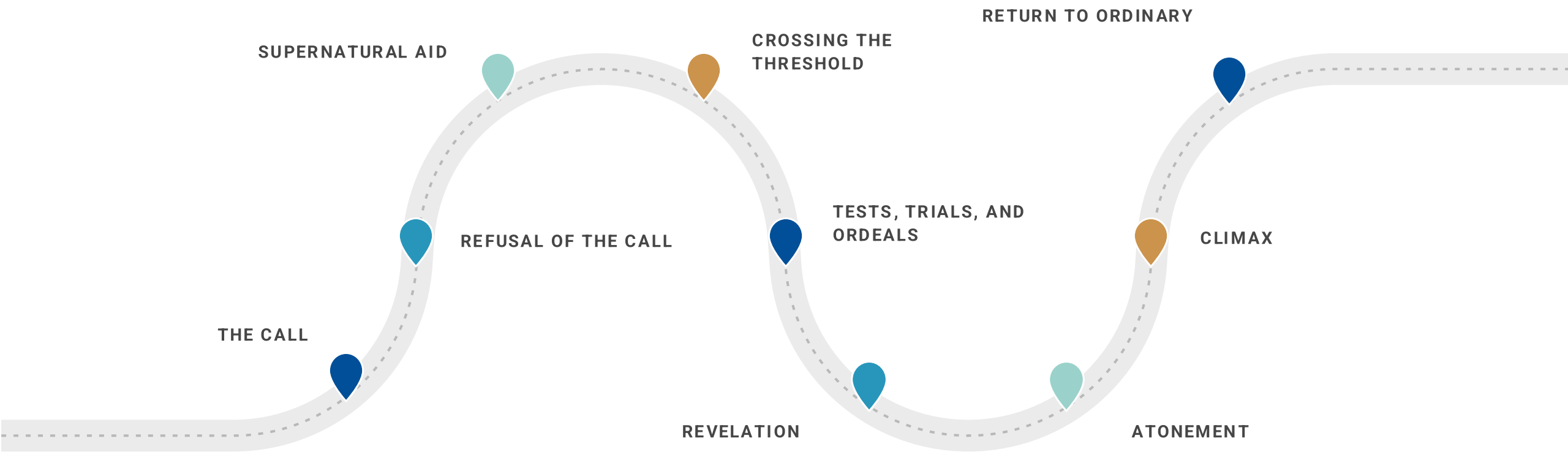


WATER
